

Sunday: Matins (Orthros) Service 9:00 a.m. Divine Liturgy 10:00 a.m. Sunday School, Every other Sunday, 9:30 a.m. to 10:15 a.m.

Divine Liturgy begins at 10:00 a.m. and we should not arrive late. When we do arrive late and the Epistle or Gospel is being read or the priest is preaching the sermon or the Great Entrance is taking place, please **RE-MAIN** in the Vestibule until it is finished before entering the Church. At the end of the Divine Liturgy please keep your conversation until the "Coffee Hour". We should leave the Church in silence.

<u>Important Notice</u>: The reception of Holy Communion is limited to Orthodox Christians who have prepared themselves by prayer, fasting and recent Confession. Confessions are heard on Sunday mornings during the Matins Service or by special appointment. The Eucharistic Fast begins at midnight on Saturday and ends up with the receiving of Holy Communion. If you are on medication or a young child, you can have a light breakfast before coming to church. If you have any questions, please call Fr. Leonard.

Our faithful are reminded that as you leave the sanctuary, to do so **reverently and guietly**. Properly, one should approach the celebrant to receive his blessings, kiss the cross, depart and **then greet neighbors and friends at fellowship hour**. We must never lose reverence for our church sanctuary as the house of God simply because services have ended. Also, please take the Sunday bulletins with you or return them to the Vestry Committee rather than leaving them in the pews or bookracks. Also, out of respect to your fellow parishioners and to God, **please turn off all electronic devices such as cell phones before entering** the church so as to not interrupt the solemnity of our prayers.

In the first book, O Theophilus, I have dealt with all that Jesus began to do and teach, until the day when he was taken up, after he had given commandment through the Holy Spirit to the apostles whom he had chosen. 

Easter Sunday: The Holy Pascha

A little before midnight on the Blessed Sabbath the **Nocturne** service is chanted. The celebrant goes to the tomb and removes the winding-sheet. He carries it through the royal doors and places it on the altar table where it remains for forty days until the day of Ascension.

At midnight the Easter procession begins. The people leave the church building singing: The angels in heaven, O Christ our Savior, sing of Thy resurrection. Make us on earth also worthy to hymn Thee with a pure heart.

The procession circles the church building and returns to the closed doors of the front of the church. This procession of the Christians on Easter night recalls the original **baptismal procession** from the darkness and death of this world to the night and the life of the Kingdom of God. It is the procession of the **holy passover**, from death unto life, from earth unto heaven, from this age to the age to come which will never end. Before the closed doors of the church building, the resurrection of Christ is announced. Sometimes the Gospel is read which tells of the empty tomb. The celebrant intones the blessing to the "holy, consubstantial, life-creating and undivided Trinity." The **Easter troparion** is sung for the first time, together with the verses of Psalm 68 which will begin all of the Church services during the Easter season.

The people re-enter the church building and continue the service of **Easter Matins** which is entirely sung.

The **canon hymns** of Christ's resurrection. ascribed to St John of Damascus, are chanted with the Troparion of the feast as the constantly recurring refrain. The building is decorated with flowers and lights. The vestments are the bright robes of the resurrection. The Easter icon stands in the center of the church showing Christ destroying the gates of hell and freeing Adam and Eve from the captivity of death. It is the image of the Victor "trampling down death by his own death." There is the continual singing and censing of the icons and the people, with the constant proclamation of the celebrant: **Christ is risen!** The faithful continually respond: **Indeed he is risen!**

It is the day of resurrection ! Let us be illumined for the feast! Pascha! The Pascha of the Lord! From death unto life, and from earth unto heaven has Christ our God led us! Singing the song of victory: Christ is risen from the dead! (First Ode of the Easter Canon)

Following the canon, the paschal verses are sung, and at the conclusion of the Easter Matins, the **Easter Hours** are also sung. In general, nothing is simply read in the Church services of Easter: every-thing is fully sung with the joyful melodies of the feast.



Every Divine Liturgy of the year commemorates Christ's "saving passion and life giving cross, His three days' burial and resurrection from the dead". Beyond this, every first day of the week throughout the year is a Day of Resurrection, for we hear the words at the Matins of Sunday's: "Ever blessing the Lord, let us sing His Resurrection."

Yet a special Sunday is designated by the Orthodox Church to celebrate the Resurrection of Christ from the dead. As we sing on this day, "This is the chosen and Holy day the Feast of Feasts, and the Triumph of Triumphs.

Obviously, Pascha or Easter is not a one shot or a one day affair in the calendar of the Church. Rather it permeates the whole calendar, it fills the whole year. And not only does it fill the year, it fills the theology, the worship, the very life of the Church.

clearly: "Now and become the fallen asleep. in Christ shall We do not talk very often about the resurrection of the body. We usually speak of the soul as surviving death, as living on in the other world, and we hesitate to speak of the restoration of that flesh that we lay to rest in the earth.

But is is precisely to this point that the Resurrection of Christ addresses itself. Man is unity of body and soul; these are not separate entities. If there is survival and life in eternity, then it must be of total man: body and soul.

St. John Damascene, in his "Exposition of the Orthodox Faith, speaks on this matter. "If the soul alone exerted itself in the battle for virtue then it alone should be crowned. If it alone was defiled with sensual pleasures, in justice it alone should be punished. But since neither soul nor body had existence apart from the other, they both are to receive their due reward or dammnation together."

And so we rightly glory in the Resurrection of Christ, and how wonderful and inspiring is that glorification! Who can describe the sadness and the solemnity of the Great Fast? And who can put into words what we feel in the night of Easter as the procession winds its way in the darkness about the Church, and then comes to the closed door where we cry "Christ is Risen"! Quickly we repeat this beautiful hymn over and over.

This world knows no greater glorification than that of Pascha. St. John Chrysostom, in his beautiful Easter homily says, "The table is fully laden; feast sumptuously everyone, let no one weep for his iniquities, let no one fear death. Christ is Risen, and the Angels rejoice. Christ is Risen, and life reigns, Christ is Risen, and not one dead remains in the grave. For Christ being risen from the dead, is become the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep. To Him be Glory, now and ever and unto ages of ages!"

This, then is Christ's great gift: our resurrection, "this is the day that the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it."



<u>THE TRADITION OF THE EGG</u>

The most important feast day of the Orthodox Church is Pascha (Easter). Traditionally, on this day the faithful exchange red colored eggs and greet one another with the Paschal greeting "Christ is Risen!" "Truly He is Risen!" and three kisses.

According to Tradition, the association of the egg with Pascha goes back to St. Mary Magdalene. Some time after the Day of Pentecost, St. Mary Magdalene appeared before the Roman Emperor to preach to him the Resurrection of Christ. According to custom, one

could not appear before the Emperor without bringing some gift. Being poor, all St. Mary could afford was a basket of eggs. Although the Emperor at first listened attentively to the grace-filled words of the Saint, when she began to speak of the Resurrection, he interrupted her saying, "It is no more possible for a man to rise from the dead than for those eggs to turn red."



At that moment, by the miraculous power of God, all the eggs in St. Mary's basket turned red. She took one of the red eggs and presented it to the Emperor saying, "Christ is Risen!"

<u>A MIRACLE</u>

As some of you may know, the Orthodox Church is celebrating Pascha/Easter today, April 27th. Thousands of Orthodox Christians gathered in Church of the Holy Resurrection in Jerusalem yesterday as they have since the 12th century to wait for the appearance of the holy light, which enters the Tomb of Christ and passes through the crowd.

The patriach entered the sealed tomb which has been inspected by the civil authorities to be sure that there is no substance present which can produce a light. He enters the tomb carrying unlighted candles. After praying, he hold sup the candles and in a split second, they are lighted and the light is spread throughout the thousands of candles in the church.

There are reports from people who were skeptics that their candles caught fire spontaneously and others reported seeing candles lighted at the top of the church at the same instant the light passes from the tomb. "There was a faint bluish light, that is not hot, which swept through the church and in an instant, all the candles were lighted".

In the Orthodox Churches here in America, just before a procession at midnight, the priest appears at the royal doors in white or light colored vestments, carrying a lighted candle. He proclaims, "Come ye, take the light from the light, that is never overtaken by night. Come glorify Christ, Risen from the dead". And the light is then passed from candle to candle as those in attendance sing, "Christ is risen from the dead, trampling down death by death, and upon those in the tombs bestowing life".


